Rules What is the Standard for Arbitrator Challenges? Who Decides Challenges?

ICSID Convention & Arbitration Rules	 Arbitrators may be challenged for any fact indicating a manifest lack of such qualities as: high moral character ability to be relied upon to exercise independent judgment Arbitrators must be disqualified if the proposal is well-founded. (ICSID Convention Articles 57, 58, 14, 40) 	 The remaining members of the Tribunal will decide the challenge. In cases when the proposal is to disqualify a sole arbitrator, or when the two members cannot decide on the challenge, the Chairman of the Administrative Council will make the decision. (ICSID Convention Article 58)
ICSID Additional Facility Rules	These rules essentially follow the ICSID Convention and Arbitration Rules. (Additional Facility Articles 7, 8, 15)	The remaining members of the Tribunal will decide the challenge. In cases when the proposal is to disqualify a sole arbitrator, or when the two members cannot decide on the challenge, the Chairman of the Administrative Council will make the decision. (Article 15)
UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules	 Any arbitrator may be challenged if circumstances exist that give rise to justifiable doubts as to the arbitrator's impartiality or independence. (Article 10[1] of 1976 Rules, Article 12[1] of 2010 Rules) 	The appointing authority, who will be chosen by the parties or the Secretary-General of Permanent Court of Arbitration, decides the challenge. (Article 12 of 1976 Rules, Article 13 of 2010 Rules)
Arbitration Rules of the Stockholm Chamber of Commerce	A party may challenge any arbitrator if "circumstances exist which give rise to justifiable doubts as to the arbitrator's impartiality or independence or if he/she does not possess qualifications agreed by the parties."	The SCC Board of Directors will decide the challenge. (Article 15[4])
(2010 Rules) Arbitration Rules of the International Chamber of Commerce	(Art. 15[1]) A disputing party may challenge an arbitrator for a "lack of independence or otherwise." (Article 11[1])	The ICC Court decides arbitrator challenges. (Art. 11[3])
